I. Read an Gale Group Article About Jim Crow:

Read about the Jim Crow laws in the article at the top of the page. (Be sure to click on View More to see the whole article). On your worksheet answer the following questions:

1. When did the laws segregating blacks from whites in the South begin?
2. Where did the name “Jim Crow” come from?
3. What did the Supreme Court decision, *Plessy vs. Ferguson* decide?
4. Which group fought against Jim Crow segregation?
5. What was the name of the Supreme Court case that made segregation of schools illegal?
6. What was one law passed in the 1960's which made Jim Crow laws illegal?
7. What does the article say was the beginning year and ending year for Jim Crow?

II: Find a Photo Showing Jim Crow segregation

Click on the images (camera icon) to find photos or images of Jim Crow on the right side of the Jim Crow Laws webpage.

Choose one photo and copy and paste it into your worksheet document. Below the photo, write two sentences explaining how this photo shows Jim Crow.

III. Read a Primary Source Document About Jim Crow.

Click on the Primary Sources icon on the right side of the Jim Crow Laws webpage. Then click on the primary source entitled: “*Letter from Marion Dickens to the Federal Writers' Project, July 6, 1936*”

1. Who is the author of this letter?
2. What does the author mean when she says that, “*I do not think that there is any section in the state of Arkansas that the negro would be discriminated against as long as he knows his place and most of our southern negroes do.*” What does **his place** mean?
3. What privileges do whites have that negroes don't enjoy in Arkansas?
